





## **State & Regional Partnerships**



**Grants for Arts Projects** (GAP) is the National Endowment for the Arts' largest grants program.

Through project-based funding, the program supports opportunities for:

- Public engagement with the arts and arts education
- the integration of the arts with strategies promoting the health and well-being of people and communities
- the improvement of overall capacity and capabilities within the arts sector

The NEA is committed to diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility, and fostering mutual respect for the diverse beliefs and values of all individuals and groups. We encourage projects that address any of the following:

- Elevate artists and makers as integral and essential to a healthy and vibrant society.
- Celebrate the nation's creativity and/or cultural heritage.
- Facilitate cross-sector collaborations that center the arts at the intersection of other disciplines, sectors, and industries.
- Contribute to healthy and thriving local, regional, state-wide, and national arts ecosystems and arts infrastructures.
- Invest in organizational capacity-building and leadership development for arts organizations, arts workers, and artists.
- Build arts organizations' capacity to serve a broad public through digital or emergent technology and/or support tech-centered creative practices across all artistic disciplines and forms.
- Originate from or are in collaboration with constituencies that include:
  - Tribal Colleges and Universities, American Indian & Alaska Native tribes, Asian American and Pacific Islander communities

### **Award Information:**

- Grants will range from \$10,000 to \$100,000
- All grants require a 1 to 1 nonfederal cost share or match
- Cost share may be any combination of cash and/or in-kind, third-party contributions



## **Organizations We Fund**

- Nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3), U.S. organizations
- Federally recognized tribal communities or tribes
- Units of state or local government
- Local arts agencies
- Local education agencies (school districts)
- Nonprofit colleges & universities



## **Eligibility Requirements for Organizations**

- Must be one of the aforementioned eligible entities
- SAM.gov and Grants.gov registrations
- Three-year history of arts programming
- 1 to 1 non-federal cost share/match
- Generally, one application per organization per year

### **Unallowable Costs**

- General Operating / Seasonal support
- Direct grants to individuals
- Direct grants to individual elementary or secondary schools
- Projects that replace arts instruction by an arts specialist
- Courses in degree-granting institutions
- Social activities such as receptions, parties, or galas
- Awards to individuals or organizations to honor achievement
- Commercial activities (the sale of concessions, food, merchandise, artwork, etc.)
- Lobbying
- Facilities construction/purchase/renovation
- Visa costs
- Project cost supported by other federal funding

Part 1 - Submit to Grants.gov	July 6, 2023 at 11:59pm ET
Part 2 – Submit to Applicant Portal	July 11-18, 2023 at 11:59pm ET
Applicants receive notification of application status	April 2024
Earliest Start Date for Proposed Project	June 1, 2024



## **February Deadline:**

Part 1 - Submit to Grants.gov	February 2024
Part 2 – Submit to Applicant Portal	February 2024
Applicants receive notice of application status	November 2024
Earliest Start Date for Proposed Project	January 1, 2025





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# **Panel Review Insights**

### Competitive projects will:

- Respond to Artistic Excellence and Artistic Merit Review Criteria
- Demonstrate alignment with the National Endowment for the Arts' commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion
- Steer clear of jargon
- Demonstrate thoughtful and intentional strategies to increase diversity and equitable practices
- Describe clear goals and ways of measuring those goals



Challenge America offers support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to populations that are underserved.

- Entry point for organizations seeking NEA funding
- Abbreviated application
- Robust structure of technical assistance
- Grants a set amount of \$10,000
- Requires cost share/match of \$10,000



"<u>Underserved</u>," as defined by our legislation and agency policy refers to:

 Those whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited by geography, ethnicity, economics, or disability.



## Eligibility:

- First-time applicants to the NEA are eligible.
- Previous NEA applicants that were not recommended for funding under any other NEA grant programs in any of the three most recent Fiscal Years are eligible.
- Previous Challenge America grantees are eligible.
- CARES Act / ARP Act grantees are eligible.
- NEA grantees in grant programs other than Challenge America from the three most recent Fiscal Years are NOT eligible.

## **Helpful Hints**

- Start early and give yourself plenty of time.
- Ensure that you have successfully completed your Grants.gov and Sam.gov registrations.
- Use Grant Search on arts.gov to research previously awarded grants.
- Read sample application narratives posted in the Applicant Resources section on arts.gov.
- Request panel feedback on your application in the future, whether or not you receive an award.
- Contact staff with questions!



## **Helpful Hints**

- Don't assume the reviewers are familiar with your organization or your work.
- Choose a project that exemplifies what you do best.
- Be as specific as possible.
- List artists & partners under consideration if not yet confirmed.
- Make sure your budget and project narrative tell the same story.
- Serve as a panelist!



## **Work Sample Tips**

- Review the work sample instructions prior to submission.
- Choose work samples that support the project in your narrative and project budget.
- Recent samples should be included.
- If applicable, include samples by artists involved in the project.
- Don't overwhelm the panelists with too many work samples as panelists' review time is limited.
- Detail exactly what you want the panel to review






# Plan of Action for Tribal Consultation

In response to President Biden's January 26, 2021 Memorandum on Tribal Consultation and Strengthening Nation-to-Nation Relationships , the National Endowment for the Arts is pleased to share its Tribal Consultation Policy. The policy is in keeping with the NEA draft Plan of Action for Tribal Consultation, which was informed by a tribal consultation call on April 7, 2021, and was informed by ongoing agency engagement with Native artists, organizations, and cultural leaders. A draft consultation policy was formally reviewed in consultation with tribal leaders on August 10, 2021 (summary). ### October 26, 2022 Consultation

On October 26, 2022, the <u>NEA held a tribal consultation</u> to gather input from tribal leaders on the needs and concerns of tribal communities as related to NEA resources and grants, to provide an update on NEA's engagement with Native cultural leaders and tribal-serving organizations, and to inform our work related to the Executive Order on Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government.
